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Letter from the Vicar:

If you are a sports fan, this summer holds the promise of Wimbledon, the Euros and the Paris Olympics - unless rain stops play. Can we bring home some glory this time? There is a more serious contest with the General Election on 4 July, and many Christian organisations are producing quides to inform the concerned Christian voter. I particularly recommend the resources from Bible Society: https:// www.biblesociety.org.uk/about-us/our-work/england-andwales/britain-and-the-bible/?source_code=BEG2404 Being a voter is an immense privilege, and a great responsibility, but as Christians we have more than our vote to change the world. When it seems that chaos is spreading in the church and the world, we have the duty and privilege of prayer. St Paul said:

" First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, ² for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. ³ This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Saviour, ⁴ who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth." (1 Timothy 2.1-4)

I urge you to join in our **Day of Prayer** for church and nation on Wednesday 3 July, before the General Election on 4 July and General Synod meeting 5-9 July. The Church will be open all day and we will have a Communion at 10am and a prayer meeting at 7.30pm at PPT.

I have now completed my six courses of chemotherapy: a body scan in early July will confirm its success. I am now hoping to make a return to public ministry in the coming weeks, though I will be treading carefully to build up my strength. My thanks to everyone who has been carrying extra responsibilities in my absence.



The Book of Numbers

In August we are a planning a sermon series through the Old Testament Book of Numbers. This might not immediately fill you with excitement! Numbers sounds boring - and the book contains many long lists - of tribes, offerings and census results. But it also includes some of the most dramatic narratives in the bible. The people of Israel muster at Mount Sinai around the Tabernacle before they march across the wilderness to take possession of the promised land, but their grumbling and disobedience bring them under God's judgement, and the first generation has to wander for 40 years in the wilderness before God brings their children home.

What value does this book have for Christians? St Paul referred to many incidents from Numbers, and said:

"Now these things happened to them as an example, but they were written down for our instruction, on whom the end of the ages has come. Therefore let anyone who thinks that he stands take heed lest he fall." (1 Corinthians 10.11-12).

The book also points us in many ways to Jesus, a greater leader even than Moses, 'the spiritual rock' who followed them (1 Cor 10.4)

We too are God's people on a journey, from the decisive victory that Jesus won for us at Easter, to the Kingdom which will be established at his Return in glory. Will we follow him with faithful obedience, or grumble constantly and disobey his word? Numbers is the story of a people called to belong to God, who struggle with their sinful nature, and the story of a holy God, who keeps his covenant promises.

It will greatly enhance your understanding of this book, if you read the set passages in advance, as they can be quite long narratives. There will be a reading guide in the weekly notice sheet, and I also recommend *Journeying with God in the Wilderness* by Mark Broadway (IVP: £9.99).



Richard Dawkins: "I'm a Christian"!

"If anyone merits a good biography, it's Ayaan Hirsi Ali. Her autobiography, Infidel, chronicles her extraordinary life, from childhood in the Islamic hell (for women) of Somalia, her escape to the Netherlands where she swiftly learned Dutch and became an MP; then the all-too-credible threat from the jihadist murderer of her colleague Theo van Gogh, in a note pinned with a dagger to his corpse. After moving to America, this valiant, charming intellectual warrior became a stalwart of the atheist movement, on a par with Christopher Hitchens, Dan Dennett and Sam Harris. But now, in an astonishing volte-face, she has announced her conversion to Christianity. Imagine the Pope suddenly becoming an atheist – or, worse, an Orangeman – and you'll get an idea of the fluttering in atheistic dovecotes caused by Ayaan's tergiversation. I asked her whether she really believes in fundamental Christian tenets such as the afterlife. Jesus's resurrection and his parthenogenetic provenance. She doesn't. I got the strong impression her Christianity is a matter of politics more than belief. Christianity is our best bulwark against Islam. Well, if rooting for benevolent Christianity in preference to malign Islam is all it takes to be a Christian, I'm a Christian too. There's more to it than that, and I certainly haven't done her justice here."

Clocks and People

Some years ago I was taken out for a meal in a rather unusual restaurant in Hollywood. On its walls hung the biggest display of clocks I have ever seen. Everywhere it was tick tock, tick tock! There were big clocks and little clocks; old clocks and modern clocks. Clocks simple and ornate; friendly and austere. The clocks on the wall were as diverse as the customers at the tables. And when you come to think about it, are not clocks somewhat akin to people, and people akin to clocks? Both have faces and both have hands, and all have something that make them tick. Like clocks some folk are fast and some are slow; some can tell the time, while others never will.

There are grandfather clocks, people like our parent's parents, cracked and wrinkled with the years but somehow steady, kindly and benign. They have been in our background a long, long time and given quality to our fevered lives. They link us with the past and give us something for today, that our devalued currencies could never buy. Their pendulum marks out extremes from which we also must return. Their measured movement checks erratic youth; and what good time they keep compared with many of today's non-starters.

Some people, of course, are the alarm clock type; little folk with loud voices, "blowing their heads off" with virtually no provocation and often at most inconvenient times. They refuse to be quiet till you pay them attention. And if you do manage to 'shut them down' or 'put them off', you are then so 'rudely' awake, that you just have to get up and get going. We rather resent them but alarm clocks in this world of sleepers, even if bad mannered, do a great deal of good.

Some people are just kitchen clocks, and perhaps that word 'just', is the most unjust thing of all, because kitchen clocks are SO like mothers. What a splendid job they do! Why, many of the best things 'cooking' in life would be altogether wasted, were it not for the set times and the disciplines, which wives and mothers make their families keep. Some may call it 'petticoat government' but the 'belle' in the kitchen can be a great safeguard against burning the cakes in more ways than one. If Ephraim had owned a kitchen clock he would have been much better balanced. As it was, he was really 'half baked'; or as Hosea described him, 'a cake not turned'.

Other folk make us think of the 'Noddy' clock of our nursery days. Some will remember the fairy-tale face and the little-boy figure nodding his head every second. With what drooping heads some idlers pass their day and squander their hours.

Some are travelling clocks, people living in cases and always on the move. And those of us in this category, know only too well, we need a lot more winding than those who stay put.

Some are jewelled clocks little wrist watches, hardly noticed till needed, but folk with great character and lots of precious things inside.

Then there are the chiming clocks, people like fathers telling the same old jokes while their families complete the chime; or lazy preachers who trot out the same old sermons year by year.

Then there are the 'stop clocks', those difficult customers for ever checking on other folk's records; exacting people, making for rivalry; fanatics for detail; always judging but never involved.

And today there are the electric clocks, people called Christians, who are nothing in themselves, but connected to the Source of power and switched on to God, tell his time accurately to a world which does not realise the day of grace is already far spent.

Believers must fulfil their vital function. We are the Lord's chronometers; time pieces of the Living God in this dark place where signs and times remain confused. We can be well known, like Big Ben, and sound out the hour of decision to millions; or we may be unknown, just a little digital for God, in some one's office; but the important thing is that we should tell God's time, just as it is, and just where we are. It is not how public or private we are that gives us our accuracy, but the degree to which we are personally regulated by God's own word 'for ever settled in heaven'. The sun and moon enunciate man's moments, months and years on earth. They are God's clock for all our history. Time here is measured there. Earth's tide and time which wait for none, are always governed from on high.

COULD YOU WRITE A LETTER TO A PRISONER? MORE NEEDED

Daylight Christian Prison Trust is calling for more letter-writing volunteers in response to a growing request from UK prisoners for pen pals.

Daylight currently has 50 letter-writers but it is no longer enough to keep up with prisoner demand. The surge in requests follows a wider rebrand last year. CEO Gaius Phillingham explained: 'We gave out new cards [about the pen pal scheme] at one prison and we had eight prisoners sign up. It was the same response at other prisons around the country. Our refreshed brand – a refreshed opportunity – suddenly produced greater need; and our supply of letter writers dried up.' Prison chaplains report a demand across the board, including from 'younger guys who don't have parental figures'. Some of the prisoners requesting a pen pal are Christians, while others know nothing about the Bible. Many prisoners' families abandoned them at the start of their prison terms.



With prayer, and what he called 'careful research', Daylight matches letter-writing volunteers with prisoners who have asked for a pen pal. Often, little is known about the prisoner and their offending.

Gaius said: 'It's sometimes better not to know what they've done (there are restrictions on what can be disclosed, for example, depending on the type of offence). We allow the relationship to develop.'

Letters from prisoners are checked by the Daylight office, following the prison authority requirements. Volunteers' letters are also read for their protection. Letter-writers can use a pseudonym and their personal details are not included.

Gaius commented: 'There is such an immediate need, and this is a great gospel opportunity, whether you are encouraging a believer or sharing the glorious gospel of Jesus.' For more information about the pen pal scheme, contact hannah@daylightcpt.org. Daylight is also celebrating its 20th year this month and is marking it by sending anniversary gift boxes to every prison in the UK. Gaius said: 'We want to encourage chaplaincies and enable them to take the gospel into prisons.' Each box includes Daylight mugs, chocolate biscuits, bookmarks, pens and tea bags – along with information about current resources, the cards for pen pals and printed copies of Bible messages.


